"From Despair to Divine Serenity"

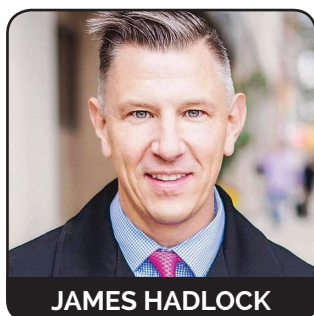
Public Speaker & Advocate for Families Battling Addiction

Do you have an addicted loved one? Do you struggle to discern what's helpful from what's hurtful? Walk the journey from despair to divine serenity with a mother who understands firsthand the deep pain of addiction in a family. Christine will share the public resources that helped save her marriage and family.

Relationship conflict (spouse or parents) is often cited as the number one cause for relapse into addiction. Learn steps to help restore relationships strained by addiction and how to support your loved ones in recovery and not support their addiction.

Christine is the Co-Owner of the Renaissance Ranch Addiction Recovery Treatment Center with her

husband and sons. She has worked for five years educating addiction-affected family members and for twelve years as a group leader in the LDS church's 12 step addiction recovery program in local churches, the jail, and prison.

Recovery. He lives with his wife, Alicia, and six of their nine children in the majestic mountains neighboring Park City, UT.



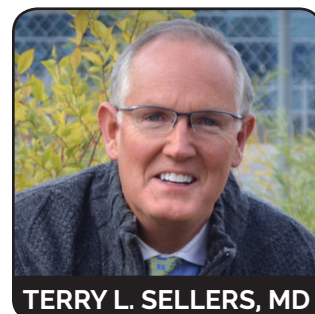
ALEMA HARRINGTON

Alema Harrington says that he is a broadcaster by profession and works in addiction recovery because it's his passion. Alema graduated from BYU where he was a member of the 1984 National Championship team and as a broadcaster he has covered the biggest events in Utah Sports including the NBA finals with the Jazz, The final four with the Utes and the 2002 Winter Olympic Games.

Harrington is active in the community and has worked as a volunteer at the youth corrections facilities in Utah teaching classes on addiction recovery. A recovering addict himself, he earned his Substance Use Disorder Counselor (SUDC) degree from UVU in 2013.

He is currently writing a book about his journey in recovery. He hopes to inspire purpose for those who have crossed similar paths in life.



TERRY L. SELLERS, MD

Dr. Terry L. Sellers received his medical degree from Saint Louis University School of Medicine and completed an OB/GYN residency at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak, Michigan.

Dr. Sellers practiced Obstetrics and Gynecology in Provo, UT for 12 years, delivering over 6,000 babies. Years of migraine headaches sparked his addiction to pain medications.

He spent many years suffering with a desire to stop using opiates and the inability to do so. He ultimately decided to get help by enrolling in substance abuse treatment and gave up his lifestyle of being a solo obstetrician.

He now has 14 years of recovery from drug addiction and is rigorously active in the recovery community. Living a recovery lifestyle for the past decade and a half has created a new perspective on life and what is important to him and he is now able to work in the addiction field as a Board Certified Addiction Medicine Physician.
